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- 1: "The Idea of Forming a Corps from amongst the Irish Emigrants in America was very Judicious, and from the Account given by Sir Henry Clinton of the Corps, as far as it has already gone, great expectations may reasonably be formed of its usefulness..."
- 2: "An Estimate of the Produce of the Peninsula between Chesapeak and Delaware Bays"
- 3: "In the 13 Counties I compute 39,000 Taxable taking the County of Cecil, which is small in Extent as the Average."
- 4: "Reasons for repealing the 4 ½ [pⁿ: C^t:] Duty in the West Indies, and for conmuting the same into a Tax to be collected here: humbly submitted to the right honourable Lord North."

28: "The Consulships are one of the principal objects aspired to by the Merchants resident or desirous to reside in the several Factorys abroad..."

29: "Dear Sir / In the Memorandum communicated to you some time ago I gave you ingenerously all the Nations I had been able to form concerning the [Scutkern] Consulships..."

30: "Hints in favor of a small Succor being sent to Jamaica, previous to the assistance that may be afforded it by fleets."

31: "The condition of the Inhabitants of Georgia desirous to return to their [illegible] seems to call for immediate attention."

42-43: "The late invented Gun called a Carronade is now generally known and many of our private Ships of war and Merchant men carry them."

44: "Discription and Utility of the Portable &[P'] Brass Cannon and Carriage proposed to be carried (together with its Ammunition) on Horses or Mules, allowing to each Beast only 22 Stone horsmans weight..."

45-47: "Pro Memoria / His Majesty having proposed to invest certain persons with powers to receive the submission of such colonies, as shall be disposed to return to their allegiance; and to do certain other acts, which cannot be done without a suspension of Acts of Parliament..."
